
March 23: Affirming Diversity Sharing his story of immigration.

News from Session Meeting: February 16, 2017

- 2016 Financial records review has been completed.
- Memorials for Jeanne Rivers totaling \$400 are to be moved to the Wells Fargo Savings account pending a decision on the best use of those funds.
- The local share of the Peacemaking Offering totaling \$124.75 will be moved to the Wells Fargo Savings account until a local Peacemaking Mission can be identified.
- The Congregation approved a 1% increase in the Pastor's Housing Allowance at the Annual Congregational Meeting. Session approved the Pastor's Stated Supply contract under those terms.
- Session accepted a progress report on the Performance Improvement Plan for Preschool Teacher, Melinda Larson.
- We are awaiting notification if Kenilworth Presbyterian Church is to be designated an Earth Care Congregation.
- The theme for 2017 Lenten Dinners will be "This We Affirm."
- The first Lenten Dinner will be March 9, 2017, Affirming Justice & Mercy. Guest speaker will be Mr. Ron Steiner with a presentation about alternatives to the death penalty.
- On a date still to be determined one Lenten Program will be entitled Affirming Our Confessions. Pastor David Jewel will lead a presentation on the Belhar Confession which was added to the PC(USA) Book of Confessions at the General Assembly in Portland last summer.
- Invitations for guest speakers Affirming Creation, Affirming Diversity and Affirming Our Community have been delivered, but confirmations of names and dates have not yet been received.





Grocery Bags for Grout – Friday, March 24

BARB'S NOTE-ABLE NEWS

THE MUSIC OF LENT





While preparing for a communion service in 1707, Isaac Watts wrote this deeply moving and very personal expression of gratitude for the amazing love that the death of Christ on the cross revealed. It first appeared in print that same year in Watts's outstanding collection, Hymns and Spiritual Songs. The hymn was originally entitled "Crucifixion to the World by the Cross of Christ." Noted theologian Matthew Arnold called this the greatest hymn in the English language. In Watts's day, texts such as this, which were based only on personal feeling, were termed "hymns of human composure" and were very controversial, since almost all congregational singing at this time consisted of ponderous repetitions of the Psalms. The unique thoughts presented by Watts in these lines certainly must have pointed the eighteenth-century Christians to a view of the dying Savior in a vivid and memorable way that led them to a deeper worship experience, even as it does for us today.

Young Watts showed unusual talent at an early age, learning Latin when he was five, Greek at nine, French at eleven, and Hebrew at twelve. As he grew up, he became increasingly disturbed by the uninspiring psalm-singing in the English churches. He commented, "The singing of God's praise is the part of worship most closely related to heaven; but its performance among us is the worst on earth." Throughout his life, Isaac Watts wrote over six hundred hymns and is known today as the "father of English hymnody." His hymns were strong and triumphant statements of the Christian faith, yet none ever equaled the colorful imagery and genuine devotion of this emotionally stirring and magnificent hymn text.

When I survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of Glory died, my richest gain I count but loss, and pour contempt on all my pride.

As we traverse through Lent, take note of the text of the hymns we sing. Is there one that speaks to you?

HEALTH TRIVIA:

Cell Phone Danger – A new study shows that in both hand-held and hands-free cell phone use caused a 40% increase in reaction time during a simulation of a pedestrian entering a crosswalk from the driver's peripheral vision compared to drivers not using any cell phone. Reason? The cognitive power needed to hold a conversation decreases the ability to process visual information. Takeaway: NEVER use ANY cell phone while driving.

MORE THAN FORGETFULNESS?

It is upsetting to forget why you walked into a room to do something or if you forget someone's name, but remember a short time later, it is probably a normal aging event. If you find yourself struggling to retain information that you just learned or if memory lapses are permanent or paired with profound inattention, such as leaving the stove on all day, tell your doctor. There is good testing available to discern mild aging cognitive impairment versus more serious diagnostics such as Dementia or Alzheimer's. Some causes can be reversed or slowed so early intervention is important. (From: Consumer Reports Health)

Discuss with your current doctor; he/she may be comfortable handling your problems, but a referral would make it easier to get in to see one who specializes in multiple problems.
