## Session Highlights June 11, 2023

- Session welcomed our new Moderator, Rev. Susan Van Stelle, Pastor of Mt. Scott Park Presbyterian Church in Portland.
- July 2nd, 9<sup>th</sup>, and 16<sup>th</sup> our Worship leader will be Rev. Susan McDougall, Spiritual Care Director for Miramont Pointe, a senior living community in Clackamas. Rev. Dr. John Hubbard will return July 23. Lay Pastor Shela Sullivan will lead Worship July 30 and August 6. Then, Rev. Susan McDougall will return August 13<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>.
- Session voted to accept the Green Team's proposal to celebrate God's creation with an outdoor Worship service August 27 led by Rev. David and Rebecca Jewel. Jonathan and Sharese Jewel will host the outdoor Worship service on their acreage near Vancouver, WA with a picnic to follow.
- The Search Committee scheduled a special visioning meeting Sunday afternoon, July 23. The Regular July Session meeting will be scheduled for Sunday afternoon, July 30.
- The new Building Use Agreement has been distributed to the various groups using space in our building. New child supervision practices are in place. Insurance coverage seems to be the most difficult requirement for some of the groups to achieve.
- A new automatic closure device has been installed on the East exterior door. Another has been purchased to be installed on the emergency exit at the first landing in the back stairwell.
- Session regretfully accepted the resignation of Presbytery Commissioner Annette Mandel. We pray that treatment may be found to restore her strength and energy.
- Elder Rebecca Jewel was elected to join Elder Katie Essick completing KPC's two Commissioner delegation to the Presbytery of the Cascades.
- Rick briefly reviewed the General Assembly amendments to the Book of Order and amendments to the constitution of the Presbytery of the Cascades that will be presented for affirmation at the June Presbytery meeting. To assure inclusivity, all gender specific words such as "men," or "women" were changed to "persons." As a result of the pandemic, all parliamentary procedures were amended to include proper electronic communication procedures. All enquirers, candidates, called and temporary pastors, and certified Christian Educators are required to complete child and elder abuse prevention classes and to be recertified every three years. In addition to a written policy dealing with child and elder abuse and a policy dealing with sexual misconduct, all PC/USA churches are now required to have two new written policies: One dealing with harassment and one with racial discrimination. There were two amendments to our Presbytery voting privileges for Presbytery Commissioners to Synod who may not currently be church Commissioners to the Presbytery. Session had no objections to these amendments.
- Session asked for more information regarding a request to use rooms in the church for some local union bargaining sessions. Due to time restrictions, they authorized an email vote on the question. Permission has subsequently been approved, but not yet confirmed by the bargaining agents.
- Session voted to create a branded Youtube Channel where recordings of our Worship services may be moved for preservation.
- Session authorized a request for a one-year extension of terms of the CATT Grant timeline because the project has not yet been completed.
- Groceries-4-Grout distributions will be moved from the Grout School grounds to the Church property while the school building is closed this summer.
- Session voted to move the church checking balance in excess of \$10,000 into the church savings account.
- The regular July Session meeting has been rescheduled for July 30, 2023 at approximately 1:30 pm. The meeting was moved back two weeks to allow full Session participation in the special visioning meeting July 23.

usic may be as old as mankind, but the songs of the ancient past are largely lost to history. Among those to create and play music were the ancient residents of Mesopotamia. Within this cradle of civilization, history, laws, and religious texts were recorded in cuneiform on tablets. Many have survived,



NOTES including an exceptional tablet: the earliest extant sheet music in the world. Known as "Hurrian Hymn No. 6," the 3,400-year-old tablet records a tune in praise of the ancient goddess Nikkal.

The ancient Hurrians were a Bronze Age people of the Near East. They had a rich culture, although much of their history and origins remain shrouded in mystery. They left behind clues however, such as a tablet bearing cuneiform discovered in the 1950s in the ruins of the city of Ugarit in northern Syria. The city was a center of trade and exchange with other Near Eastern civilizations, and even kingdoms as far as Egypt. On the tablet are four lines of text in the Ugarit dialect. While the language is difficult to interpret, the "Hurrian Hymn No. 6" is clearly the world's earliest extant melody or song.

The words of the song lie in the upper quadrant, while the lower contains the "notes." Scholars believe that sections of repeated lyrics indicate a refrain. The Akkadian cuneiform below is a heptatonic diatonic scale for a nine-stringed lyre. They are known as musical intervals. While the exact translations are somewhat contested, Professor Anne Draffkorn Kilmer of the University of California, Berkley translated the tablet in the 1970s and first attempted the ancient song. She and her colleagues created a record of it entitled, Sounds From Silence, which you can listen to below.

The "Hurrian Hymn No. 6" tablet is one of 29 musical texts discovered in the palace of Ugarit dating to around 1,400 B.C.E. as Hurrian civilization was waning. These musical relics are not the oldest ever discovered, although the oldest full song. A fragment of 4,000-year-old Sumerian musical notation with instructions and tunings for a song about the ruler Lipit-Ishtar predates the "Hurrian Hymn." Investigating these earliest works shows the rich knowledge of music among the ancients, suggesting music is a pleasure and an art that humans have always appreciated.

Listen to the "Hurrian Hymn No.6," a hymn to Nikkal, an ancient Mesopotamian goddess.



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#### Lemon Chicken Salad Dressing: Mix together ¼ cup olive oil Grated peel of ½ lemon Juice of one lemon 1 Tablespoon honey ¼ teaspoon ground ginger ¼ teaspoon curry powder <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub>teaspoon garlic powder Toss with dressing:

1½ cups cubed, cooked chicken 1½ cups grapes, halved (or cantaloupe, strawberries, Mandarin oranges, etc) 1/2 cup celery, chopped

Other toppings: Sliced toasted almonds, chopped walnuts or hazelnuts.
