## A Message from Pastor Susan McDougall

t has been a month since I started as the Stated Supply Pastor at Kenilworth, but it has been so rich and full a time that it feels to me like I started yesterday. I feel blessed to be here.

As I was trying to write this article, a verse kept tugging at me: In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. Mark 1:35

This verse from the Gospel of Mark about Jesus is part of the Lectionary passage for February 4. Sometimes one verse out of many keeps floating to the top of my awareness, gently insisting that it be given its proper due. Perhaps it is because this month we will observe Ash Wednesday and enter into the season of Lent, spending time contemplating Pilgrimage and Prayer. Or perhaps it's because getting up in the dark to go to a deserted place to pray has its own allure, in a time when electronic devices clamor for our attention round the clock.

Barb included this quotation for our weekly prayer circle:

A clergyman once said to me that a railway compartment, if one has it to oneself, is an extremely good place to pray in "because there is just the right amount of distraction." When I asked him to explain, he said that perfect silence and solitude left one more open to the distractions which come from within, and that moderate amount of external distraction was easier to cope with.

Whether a deserted place calls to you, or whether moderate distraction is appealing, I hope you will consider the invitation to explore Pilgrimage and Prayer at Lenten suppers. I look forward to hearing your thoughts and to getting to know one another better. Pastor Susan

Giving chocolate is normalized on the holiday, but most of that chocolate is unethically sourced. Add the other throwaway gifts, like balloons, stuffed animals, and decorations, and Valentine's Day can be quite difficult on the environment. But it doesn't have to be!

Valentine's Day is about celebrating love, and, whether that's love for a partner, friend, or family member, Valentine's Day is a wonderful time to let people know you care about them. There are many ways to do this sustainably, ethically, and with love for the Earth. Here are some sustainable ideas for Valentine's Day gifts:

- Buy Fair Trade Chocolate: Look for chocolate with the Fair Trade logo to buy ethically sourced chocolate. Learn where your favorite chocolate companies fall on the spectrum of sourcing through the Food Empowerment Project.
- Buy a long-lasting, durable present that the receiver will keep for a long time, such as a mug, piece of art, or much needed item, by using your listening and observation skills to identify something that the recipient actually needs.
- Buy jewelry responsibly and sustainably. If you are going to give fine jewelry as a gift this Valentine's Day, consider buying secondhand!
- Make your own Valentine's card.
- Gift a living plant. You can even choose a plant that will help to clear out pollutants in the home.
- Bake your loved one's favorite dessert or buy something for them from a locally owned bakery.

## COOKING WITH CAROL Saltine Toffee Bark As requested by popular demand



- This is so quick and easy and can be made gluten and dairy free.
- What you need is a cookie sheet with sides, aluminum foil, crackers (any kind can be used or even a shortbread cookie) brown sugar, butter (or plant butter), chocolate chips.
- Before you start, wrap your baking sheet in aluminum foil.
   Make sure to use cooking spray or coconut oil and grease well.
- Set temp on oven to 400.
- In a saucepan add one cup of softened butter and one cup of packed brown sugar. Heat on medium heat until bubbly (about 3 to 4 minutes).
- Pour and spread toffee over the crackers and place in the oven for 10 minutes.
- Remove from the oven and spread a bag of chocolate chips over the top and cover with foil.
- Wait for about 10 minutes for them to melt. Spread out over the crackers and toffee. Add whatever topping you like, nuts, candy, etc.
- Let cool until set and enjoy.
