

In the ancient world, no celebration was considered more glorious than the march of triumphant returning warriors through their capital city. Many visual depictions have been made of the victorious Roman soldiers in the early centuries marching proudly through the streets and arches of Rome, leading captive slaves and hearing the boisterous approval of cheering admirers.

Christ our Savior fought the greatest battle of all time against the prince of this world and all of his legions. Our Lord returned triumphant to His Father, having conquered not only sin, death, and the grave, but Satan and hell also. Now He sits on the Father's right hand as the ruler of His kingdom and our personal advocate before God.

But the day of our celebration is just ahead. One can picture with imagination the procession that will occur in heaven when the Captain of Our Faith, Christ Himself, leads His Bride, the Church, through the heavenly portals amidst the shouts and songs of praise and glory to the "risen, conqu'ring Son."

"Thine Is the Glory" was originally written in 1884 in French - "A Toi la Gloire," by **Edmond L. Budry**, a pastor in Vevey, Switzerland. Nearly forty years later, it was translated into English by Richard B. Hoyle and appeared in the *Cantate Domino Hymnal* used by the Student Christian Federation.

What happened to the Styrofoam recycling? You may have noticed that the large box for collecting Styrofoam and #6 is no longer sitting on the church porch. We have stopped collecting these plastics due to the loss of the recycling plant. According to the Agilyx webpage, the recycling project was a five -year test of the feasibility of the advanced chemical recycling of polystyrene. Despite proving that the recycling technology was successful in removing over 6 million pounds of plastic from landfills, the company has shut the plant. Agilyx is in discussions with other local organizations that may be able to resume collection of these materials in a new location in the coming months. They will provide another update once those details have been finalized.

What we are recycling? We continue to recycle clear #1 plastics and plastic bags, batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, eyeglasses, tabs from bread bags, and small screw caps. These may be left the recycling center at the end of the hallway to the storeroom.

Session Highlights March 17, 2024

- David McDougall has requested a transfer of his membership from First Presbyterian in Vancouver, WA to KPC.
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- Session increased the salary of the Office Administrator to more closely represent the number of hours Laura has been contributing. The increase will be retroactive to January 1, 2024.
- Session decided to continue the practice of locking and monitoring the front doors during Worship services in response to the security alert issued by the Presbytery of the Cascades in December, 2023. Karl Berger has volunteered to greet any late arrivals in the Narthex for an additional 10 minutes at the beginning of the Worship services.
- Session reviewed and amended the proposed 2024 budget, but final approval was postponed pending further clarification.
- The polystyrene (Styrofoam) collection project has been discontinued due to the shutdown of the Agilyx recycling center in Tigard. Reportedly, by July 1, 2025 recycling facilities in the Portland area will begin accepting polystyrene destined for recycling facilities.
- Session agreed that the purchase of another garden shed dedicated to storage of polystyrene is unnecessary at this time
- An Elder training retreat is schedule from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 11, 2024 at First Presbyterian Church, Vancouver WA.
- Define Oztek and Sarah Smilkstein are the Preschool Parent Board representatives on the preschool teacher search committee. They join Rick Votrobeck representing the Session and current teacher, Allisen Hein. Help Wanted ads have been distributed via the PCPO (Parent-Child Preschool Organization) of cooperative preschools, Craigslist, and the KCP alumni community. Interviews hope to be scheduled during the first week of April.
- The chimney for the furnace serving the Sanctuary and Basement fellowship room has been cleaned, but the exhaust flue needs to be replaced. Efforts to repair the ignition controls continue to be exasperating.
- Session elected Rebecca Jewel as one KPC Commissioner to Presbytery. A second KPC Commissioner for the April 19-20 Presbytery meeting at Westminster PC of Portland has not been identified.
- Elders were encouraged to register for the Interfaith Campaign and Collective Sun Webinar designed to assist non-profit organizations in researching the possibility of converting to a solar electricity conversion system.
- Session agreed to consider a proposal from the Mu Phi Alumni Fraternity of Oregon to host a series of concerts/recitals with all proceeds designated towards the repair of the KPC organ.
- Pastor Susan will be on vacation April 18 April 30 and Laura Schaefer will be on vacation April 26 - April 29.
- The April Session meeting will be moved up to April 14 at 1:30 p.m..

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


To our worship team,
