

From the desk of Pastor Susan McDougall Hello Friends,



It has been over two weeks since we left for vacation. We managed to attend church online this past Sunday, and it reminded me how much we enjoy being in worship with you. Even though Earth Day was officially April 22nd, we will



celebrate God's Gift of Creation to us this Sunday, May 5th. Becky Jewel has generously given her knowledge and imagination and energy to Sunday's service. It will be a wonderful and meaningful time of worship.

We are an Earth Care Congregation, one that recognizes that restoring creation is not a short-term concern to be handled in a few years, but a continuing task to which the nation and the world must give attention and commitment. We were first recognized in 2017, thanks to Elder Peggy Morgan's efforts. Laura Schaefer and the Green Team took over, and Becky Jewel succeeded Laura in 2021.

Acting Stated Clerk of the PCUSA (Presbyterian Church USA) Reverend Bronwen Boswell recently stated that "we recommit ourselves to advocating for policies and practices that address the root causes of climate change and promote environmental justice for all Creation and for all people in it. This includes reducing greenhouse gas emissions, transitioning to renewable energy sources, standing with communities impacted by environmental racism, oppression, or extractive industries, and promoting sustainable and equitable development. We urge Presbyterians to challenge consumerism and be mindful of consumption. We also recognize the importance of supporting communities already experiencing the harmful impacts of climate change through adaptation measures, disaster relief, and economic assistance." It is a tall but urgent challenge, one that Kenilworth has stepped up to. This Sunday we have an opportunity to reflect on the worthy efforts Kenilworth has already made, as well as to lift the future of this mission to God in prayer.

Session Highlights April 14, 2024

• Session met with Ms Kara Reavis and Ms Kira Billek and approved the terms of their new preschool teacher/co-director contracts. Kara will fill 70% of the three-quarter FTE position during the 2024/2025 school year, and Kira will fill the other 30% of the three-quarter FTE position.



- Kira Billek presented the proposed amendments to the Kenilworth Community Preschool Bylaws as approved by the Preschool Parent Board. Session also approved the amendments as proposed.
- Katie Essick has accepted Session's request that she continue to serve as Kenilworth's Commissioner to Presbytery for 2024. She joins Becky Jewel who was affirmed last month.
- Presbytery Commissioner Becky Jewel presented two overtures for Session's consideration. At their April meeting Cascades Presbytery will be asked to vote their support for these two overtures to General Assembly which meets in Salt Lake City in July.
- One Overture: On Becoming Free from Plastic Pollution is brought by the Presbytery of the Susquehanna Valley. KPC already works to achieve the goals proposed in this overture. Session voted unanimously to support the presentation at the Presbytery of the Cascades meeting.
- The second Overture: Protecting Utah's National Monuments and Wildlands for Ecology and Justice is brought by Presbytery of Utah. It asks the PC/USA to join other faith leaders in the US who are urging ongoing protection of the restored Bear Ears National Monument and Grand Staircase Escalante National Monument. In addition to protecting God's creation it offers support of the indigenous people who call this area their sacred place and home. Session voted unanimously to support the presentation at the Presbytery of the Cascades meeting.
- Becky also reported a group of participants in the Portland CROP Walk April 28, 2024 would like to be recognized as the Kenilworthian Walkers. Session consented to the group's recognition as affiliated with KPC.
- Pastor McDougall has requested the pulpit be moved to the side so it is not positioned directly in front of the cross.
- Session decided to continue the practice of locking and monitoring the front doors during Worship services in response to the security alert issued by the Presbytery of the Cascades in December, 2023. Karl Berger has volunteered to greet any late arrivals in the Narthex for an additional 10 minutes at the beginning of the worship services.
- Session voted to approve the proposed 2024 budget as amended.
- An Elder training retreat is schedule from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, May 11, 2024 at First Presbyterian Church, Vancouver WA.
- The Preschool Parent Board has collected bids totaling between \$5,000 and \$6,000 dollars to replace the wooden fence around the play yard with a similar structure this summer. Session voted to pay half the cost of a four ft. high cedar fence that includes similar entrance gates to those in the current fence structure.
- The church HVAC assessment will be reenergized because of the ongoing repair needs.
- A neighborhood piano teacher, Mel Hart, will be invited to visit the church to determine the possibility of using church space to teach piano lessons.
- Earth Care Sunday will be May 5, 2024.
- Pentecost is May 19.
- The May Session meeting will be May 19, following the fellowship hour.
- The next Red Cross Blood Drive at KPC will be May 30.

Taking the Train for Sustainable Travel

Taking the train is rarely a practical option for travel in the US. And that's a problem, because passenger trains are usually the most environmentally friendly way to get between two cities.

Americans have some of the largest carbon footprints in the world, mostly because of our driving habits. Most of us generate more miles commuting than taking road trips, but when it comes to regional

travel, automobiles are only matched by flights for carbon inefficiency. By comparison, standard diesel rail travel generates a quarter the emissions of a single-passenger vehicle. And when the electricity source is low-carbon, electric trains generate only a small fraction of the emissions of a diesel train engine.

The next time you are planning travel, consider taking the train. There are many options leaving (or returning to Portland.) David and Becky have fallen in love with train travel and have travelled on the Empire Builder, The Southwest Chief, Coast Starlight, Amtrak Cascades and the Lake Shore Limited. They have also encouraged others to ride the rails this summer, including Rick, Barb, Jon and Sharese.

There are many options for taking the train for your regional domestic travel, like to Seattle or Eugene or points further south. Not only will it make your travel more sustainable, but you could also save money. Even when it costs a bit more, rail travel is a cultural experience that will enrich the trip, and it definitely provides more interesting views than sitting in the aisle seat of a short haul flight.

Easter Sunday



We were very fortunate to have Will Stellbrink enhance our worship service with his trumpet playing. We were also blessed with Jonathan Jewel's tenor voice singing "Forever" following the sermon and the KPC Choir anthem. The "Hallelujah Chorus" sung by many in the congregation at the end gave praise for the Risen Lord!

On May12th we will celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. Our closing hymn will be "Jesus Shall Reign".

The spread of Christianity has been phenomenal. In spite of cruel persecution of Christ's followers in the first three centuries A.D. and from time to time through the years since, His kingdom has continued to spread to "realms and people of every tongue." Periods of attack on believers have served only to increase their fervor and growth. Then in recent years with the development of technology - radio, television, Internet, Bible translations, and distributions - the preaching of the gospel has been heard by more people than ever before in history.

When this stirring hymn was written in 1719, however, the evangelist missionary movement that we know in our time had scarcely begun. In 1779 William Carey was one of the first to try to persuade Christians to carry the gospel message to unenlightened people of the world. Isaac Watts was certainly quite prophetic when he paraphrased this text from Psalm 72. It is still considered one of the finest missionary hymns ever written and has been sung in countless native tongues. In the South Sea Islands in 1862, five thousand primitive people sang this hymn as the king abolished their native laws and established a Christian constitution.

It is thrilling for us to realize that the praise of Jesus, Bethlehem's humble Babe, is continuing to spread and that some day soon His kingdom will "spread from shore to shore" and every tribe, language, people, and nation will bow down and exalt His name together.
