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

Notes from What exactly does the Presbyterian Urban Network (PUN) parish nurse do?



That is a question that I sometimes get asked by others and one that I frequently ask myself! The truth is that this work is so varied and variable that definitions are somewhat illusive. Some things I might do even if I did not have this position but even

those things take on a different weight and responsibility since I am working for this consortium of congregations that supports and directs my work. What I can say, to those who ask, is what I have done *this* week but different weeks, different months, different seasons bring different tasks.

This week started out with a complicated case of an 82-year-old man with Covid. Unfortunately, he is from the East Coast and although he can still travel by himself he becomes muddled when things don't go according to plan - like contracting Covid the day before he was supposed to fly home. When I was brought into the situation I started a text stream between him, his two daughters, and myself.

The daughters changed his plane ticket and secured him housing. I moved him to the hotel, brought him food and attended his doctor's appointment with him. This, however, turned out to be the easy work. Besides filling the Paxlovid order all his other standard medications needed new prescriptions as well since he had only brought enough for his intended stay. Multiple phone calls, emails, faxes and trips to the pharmacy ensued before he had what he needed. In the midst of this I was asked to help with someone who was having unexpected tachycardia - which entailed more phone calls, visits, and another trip to the doctor.

Between running around addressing these needs there were two meetings concerning a men's retreat I am leading at one of the PUN churches, some consultations made for parishioners at another church, a sermon to complete for yet another congregation and, of course, my own weekly PUN prayer service to produce. Was this an especially busy week? Yes...but every week has its twists and turns.

Kenilworth at Work

Yesterday evening I looked at my calendar for today and realized that I had nothing on until noon. Great, I could finally get some work done for my university job... but... then I remembered my ordination vows. Back in 1994, when I became an officer of this denomination, the very first promise I made was "To pray with and for my congregation..."

Being a parish nurse is more than just being a case manager, a health educator, and one who preaches about how the physical realities of our bodies and the spiritual health of our souls are intertwined. It is also about trusting that God is intimately concerned and connected with the journeys we are each on.


Early this morning I slipped into a lengthy prayer service at Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church. Unlike ours, Orthodox liturgy is cyclical. This means that they do not have just one opportunity to lift up the prayers of the people - but many. Over and over and over again I lifted prayer for the safe return trip of the man from Baltimore, answers for the women with unexpected cardiac distress, engagement from the group of men I would soon lead on retreat, attentiveness from the congregation I would preach to on Sunday and patience from the faithful group who attend my weekly prayer service. I also prayed for a dozen other individuals from the PUN churches who health journeys I am privileged to be aware of.

The health ministry of PUN *is* unique *and* diverse. It is physical and educational and always fundamentally spiritual. At times, it can even be overwhelming. Thankfully, though, whether busy or quiet the ministry of PUN is held tenderly and passionately by the prayers of many. And I am honored to work, serve and pray along with them. 

Summer 2024



G4G successfully implemented many changes in our 13 weeks this season. Pantry hours were 12:30-1:30 to finish before high temperatures. We were at KPC every Friday as Grout Elementary was closed for repairs. Conflict about who was next in line was resolved with issuing numbered tickets.

As the school year begins the pantry hours are later & longer: 1:30-3:00 on Friday. We also plan to stay at Kenilworth instead of switching location once a month.

I can't say enough to thank the 51 volunteers for making this happen. Some only had a few hours to work and others faithfully appear week in and week out. Over 1,000 hours altogether, averaging 78 hours a week. Here's the huge numbers for the past 13 weeks:

Session Highlights July 21, 2024

- Pastor Susan administered the adult baptism of Zulmay Yousefi July 21, 2024.
- The Mission Committee requested, and Session approved a \$10,000 budget for 2024.
- The Properties Committee presented and Session approved a Barnabas Grant application for up to \$8,000 to assist with purchase and installation of a heat pump to serve the heating and cooling needs of the Sanctuary and basement fellowship hall.
- The play yard fence has been removed and replacement will begin soon.
- A few brave souls tended to the first scheduled day for weeding and nurture of the church grounds in 100°F temperatures. More days will be scheduled when rain returns with cooler temps.
- A sign-out sheet is now present at the church for those seeking to use tables, chairs, and/or canopies.
- Holy Trinity Lutheran Church has offered to donate their electronic church organ to KPC.
- Barb Votrobeck and Allison Zimmerman are researching the possibilities. Barb reported a scheduled meeting with Mr. Joe Pettit for analysis and suggestions regarding the condition of our pipe organ.
- Session called a special meeting of Session at 12:30 p.m. July 28 to discuss acceptance of the organ from Holy Trinity Lutheran Church.

Session Highlights July 28, 2024



Barb Votrobeck reported that Joe Pettit strongly recommends getting a second opinion on cost of repairs and the necessity of removing our pipe organ for repairs. Removal could cause much more damage and need for extensive repairs. He also noted that ours is a rare pneumatic organ, not the typical mechanical style normally produced in that era.

- Mr. Pettit recommended a Seattle firm for additional repair analysis.
- The Session voted to accept the gift of an electronic church organ from Holy Trinity Lutheran Church and authorized a cost to move it to KPC of not more than \$500.
- No intention to replace the church's pipe organ is implied.

Session Highlights August 18, 2024

- Session voted to approve a non-profit PayPal account for Kenilworth Community Preschool with Laura Schaefer as the administrator.
- Session voted to accept Ms Rachel Broach's offer to voluntarily complete the annual review of KPC's financial records.
- e annual
 - The Mission Committee reported the assistance bills Session had previously approved totaled \$1,900.78.
- The Properties Committee reported current quotes for the heat pump for the Sanctuary and lower fellowship hall ranged from \$33,500 to \$36,600 including removal of the old furnace. Electrical upgrade estimates vary widely in both scope and expense. Actual quotes are pending.
- The Properties Committee also reported that urgent repairs are needed on the North side gutter and fascia of the church. A DIY assessment has been proposed.
- Session requested a plan of approach to weed and update the landscaping. Edith and Karl will ask Tammy Weatherly to assist them in preparing the plan.
- Holy Trinity Lutheran Church's Electronic Organ will soon be available for moving.
- Session has chosen a New Member Curriculum, created by Kathleen Henrion for Glendale Presbyterian Church, Glendale, MO and distributed by Sacred Calls.







Cat Owner Conundrum: Can Cat Litter Be Sustainable?

Pet owners can take steps to reduce their pet's carbon footprint. Some of these choices are easier than others, like buying pet toys and accessories made from natural or recyclable materials and choosing pet food without wasteful packaging. Other questions are more vexing, particularly those related to pet waste.

Cats pose a special problem because most owners use a clay-based litter, which is not biodegradable. Add to that the fact that owners typically scoop it into plastic bags, and you have a dangerously mined material - the sodium bentonite clay used in the litter - just piling up along with plastic in landfills. Clearly, it's time to make a switch.

In place of clay or crystal litters, cat owners should swap to one of the following eco-friendly options. You may have to make some additional adjustments when you do, but it's worth it for your pet and the planet.

1. Paper Litter

Paper litter is a popular litter alternative and most pet owners use it at least occasionally, for example if their cat is recovering from surgery. Pet owners commonly use it when litter training kittens, since it's less dangerous if they consume it. As for its environmental impact, paper litter is made from recycled materials and will, of course, break down easily after it's used. The main issue pet owners have with it is that it's not as absorbent as clay litter, nor does it block odors well.



If you're considering switching to paper litter (or another low absorbency litter), you may also want to make some changes to your cat's diet. Feeding a holistic diet like Earthborn Holistic Pet Food that includes limited ingredients can improve your cat's gut health and reduce litter box odors. Just be careful not to make too many changes at once, as cats often require some time to adjust to new food or litter.

2. Corn Litter

Corn and wheat litters have been around for years, but litter made from renewable crops has become much more popular in the last few years, with corn continuing to dominate the market. Because it's more absorbent than similar paper products, corn litter is cleaner and retains less odor than similar products. Also, most corn litter products clump like clay litter, which many pet owners consider a key feature.

A Note of Caution: Never flush or compost cat litter — even if it's biodegradable. That's because of the dangers posed by Toxoplasma gondii, a parasite that some cats host. In coastal areas, T. gondii has been identified as the cause of death in the sea otter population, while elsewhere, composted cat feces can release T. gondii into the water table. Thankfully, most people infected with T. gondii don't develop symptoms; however, people with compromised immune systems and fetuses born to infected mothers can suffer severe consequences.

The expert consensus: It's best to dispose of cat litter in the trash, even if you're using a biodegradable litter. Use a paper bag or other compostable container so that you're not contributing to plastic waste in the landfill. Once in the landfill, toxoplasmosis is sufficiently sequestered so you no longer need to worry about it.

The bottom line is: Make the litter switch, but keep sending it to the landfill. It's the most environmentally responsible combination.
