Bright Sunday to Shine at KPC on April 27


"Risus Paschalis" (Easter Laughter), begins with the premise that God played a joke on the Devil. The Devil thought that evil had won with the death of Jesus on the Cross. God got the last laugh by raising Jesus from the dead. In 15th century Europe, priests

played jokes on the congregation in the week after Easter. That tradition gave rise to Bright Sundays in the USA over the past several decades.

The seeds of holy humor were sown into KPC by Rev. Elmer "Bud" Frimoth in the 1960's. A harvest of laughter has followed. Since 2011, Bright Sunday has taken the form of skits, jokes, and songs. More recently, there have been chancel comedies adapting the stories of Noah, Jonah, the Prodigal Child, Moses, Joseph (the OT one) and Adam and Eve into a Portland context.

This year, the stories of Naomi and Ruth and Boaz will be juxtaposed into Portland. Writing and casting are in progress. Rehearsals will include a read through, probably as a Zoom meeting in mid-April, (the 12th?) with a rehearsal on Saturday April 26. The Sunday will also feature an open mic for jokes suitable for church, some hymns with adapted lyrics, and an all congregation kazoo band. Colorful attire is invited.

April 13 is Palm and Passion Sunday. 

Juan Soto and Jamie Truitt, from the Oregon Food Bank (OFB), made an official visit to our pantry on February 7. They offered suggestions on managing our intake process. As a result, we implemented a lottery system, as used in neighboring pantries. It's not flawless; having been received well by some and not-so-well by others.

Probably most memorable for all was the Valentine's Day snowfall. OFB canceled their delivery and G4G canceled our pantry. A neighbor kindly posted signage in case clients ventured to our site.

We ultimately received 30+ banana boxes of assorted groceries on the 21st. I asked for 8-10 volunteers to sort and shelve the contents the following Monday. TWELVE volunteers made quick work of it and enjoyed lunch and friendship afterwards.

With some trepidation, we moved from 34th Avenue into the church parking lot on March 7. It was a beautiful springlike day with sunshine and warm temperatures. The rest of the month we were soaked with rain and winds. Nonetheless we smiled and enjoyed the improved safety of not being in the street and having room to grow. Earth Care Congregation by the Presbyterian Church
(U.S.A.)'s Presbyterian Hunger Program through February
2026. The Earth Care Congregation certification is designed
to recognize churches that make the commitment to take
seriously God's charge to "till and keep" the garden.

Began in 2010, this PC(USA) national program is celebrating 15 years of certifying churches and celebrating environmental ministry across 4 major areas of a congregation's life: worship, education, facilities, and outreach in the community.

Earth Care Congregations exist as strong community partners in their own areas as well as models for Presbyterian congregations across the country. One of the goals of this program is to inspire churches to care for God's earth in a holistic way, through integrating earth care into all aspects of their church life. By the time a church has recertified for several years, the earth care ethic becomes ingrained in a congregation's culture, spreads to the surrounding community, and impacts the personal lives of individual church members.

Obtaining this status speaks to the serious commitment that KPC has made to care for God's earth. First certified in 2017, this begins our ninth year as an Earth Care Congregation. And we couldn't have done it without the cooperation and commitment of all of you. Thank you.

KPC is just one of the 361 congregations in 41 states that chose to dedicate themselves to intentional care of God's earth this year. This denominational program for churches has lasted longer and been more

successful than other models we've seen that are both less rigorous and

more resourced. And it's the individual churches that deserve all the credit for the success of the program. Our Earth Care Congregations are vital parts of their communities and unrivaled witnesses to caring for God's creation and we are so thankful for their work in the world, "says Jessica Maudlin, Associate for Sustainable Living and Earth Care Concerns for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
